Mrs. Eleno Estrada Mungia, native Tucsonan and member of a prominent pioneer family, was claimed by death yesterday afternoon, at her home, 416 North Court street. Mrs. Mungia, who had been ill for a year, was afflicted with heart disease. She was the wife of Deputy Sheriff Carmen Mungia.

Mrs. Mungia was born in Tucson 52 years ago and besides her husband, is survived by 10 children. She and Deputy Mungia were married 38 years ago. Her surviving children are: Henry and Fernando Mungia, who reside in California; Mrs. Carmen Provencio, Mrs. Sarah Aguirre and Frank, Tony, Amelia, Fred, Earnst and Alnie Mungia.

MRS. MUNGIA DIES, 52 YEARS IN TUCSON

Mrs. Eleno Estrada Mungia, wife of Deputy Sheriff Carmen Mungia and a resident of Tucson all her life, died at her home at 416 North Court street yesterday afternoon after a year's illness of heart disease. Mrs. Mungia was 52 years old and was born in Tucson, coming from one of the pioneer families of this section of Arizona.

Mrs. Mungia, besides her husband, leaves 10 children, all of them living in Tucson excepting two sons who reside in Los Angeles. She was married to Carmen Mungia 38 years ago, they both having been born here. Besides the two sons Henry and Fernando, in California, she leaves Carmen (Mrs. Provencio), Sarah (Mrs. Aguirre), Frank, Tony, Amelia, Fred, Ernest and Annie Mungia.

As a place in which to live Tucson looks too good to Miss Dora Munguia, efficient and attractive young clerk in the office of Mrs. Allie Dickerman, postmaster, to even consider leaving the Old Pueblo, despite the fact that she has been assured a much more remunerative post in the employ of the Mexican government, when her uncle, General Plutarco Elias Calles, assumes his duties as president of the republic.

Because of her efficiency as a stenographer and her knowledge of both the Spanish and English languages, in which she has been educated, Miss Munguia was assured in a recent letter from her uncle, whose election to the presidency of Mexico has been proclaimed in the press of Mexico of

Miss Munguia immediately signified that there would be "nothing doing" in the matter of excepting a position that would take her away from Tucson. Miss Munguia has also received numerous offers of a good position with the best of pay, by attaching herself to the Mexican Consulate-General at New Orleans, where another uncle, Arturo Elias, is consul general. NATIVE DAUGHTER OF TUCSON TAKEN BY DEATH, AT 71

Miss Francisca Mungia, who died yesterday, was a native of Tucson, having been born in the presidio chapel of the old army post, back of the present city hall, seventy-one years ago. Her baptismal record, preserved in her home at 33 East Sixteenth street, bears the date of Dec. 7, 1857.

The deceased was the daughter of Jesus Mungia, who was also born in the Old Pueblo in 1822, and died in 1918, at the age of ninety-six. His home in the old days was on a ranch between Tucson and Tubac.

The old adobe building, still standing on South Church street and back of the Martin Drug Store, No. 1, was the home of the Mungia family 50 years ago. Miss Mungia's mother was also a native of the city,

although the records do not show the date of her birth.

The deceased contracted pneumonia a short time ago, and this led to her death at her home early yesterday. She had never married, but adopted a child and cared for her, Miss Angellita de Pacheco, who is now living here.

The funeral arrangements were under the direction of the Reilly Undertaking Co., and burial was made in Holy Hope cemetery following services in St. Augustine cathedral at nine o'clock this morning.
