Ordinance No. 47
Amending Ordinance No. 4, entitled "Ordinance No. 4 Prescribing Licenses for Saloons and Theatrical Halls."
Whereas the growth, advancement and material progress of the Town of Safford, and the improvement of all conditions which will appeal to the citizens of adjoining localities and neighboring towns, should be the chief and primary concern of the members of this body and all persons residing in our active, energetic and growing municipality; and
Whereas we believe the objects of this Ordinance is of momentous importance to the Town of Safford and will meet the hearty approval of its citizens generally; therefore
Be it Ordained by the Council of the Town of Safford:
Section 1. That Section One, of Ordinance Eight, of the Town of Safford, be and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:
Section 2. The proprietor or manager of every saloon or public drinking place where spirituous wine or malt liquors are sold, in the Town of Safford, shall pay an annual license tax of Four Hundred (\$400.00) Dollars, payable in advance.
Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after March 31, 1909.
