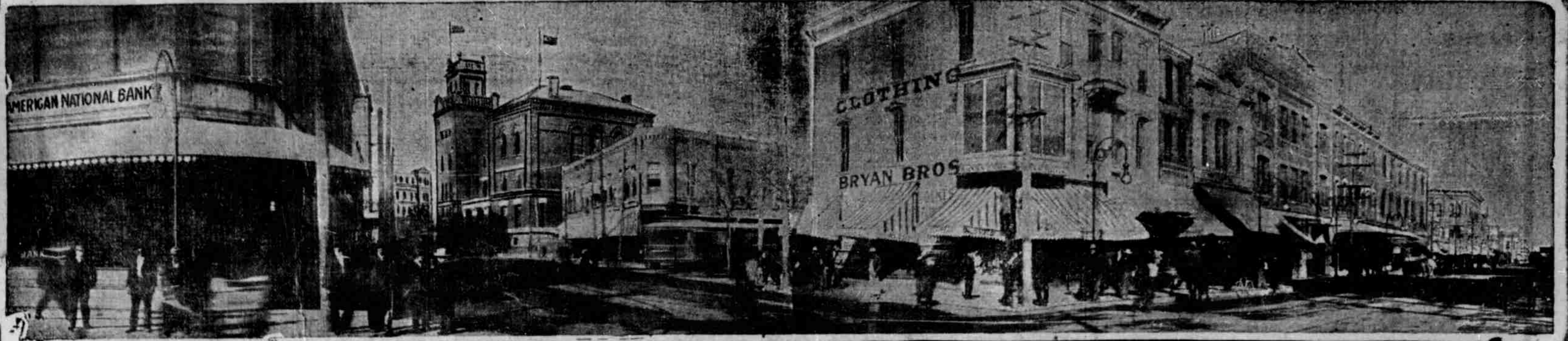

A DAY'S DOINGS IN ARIZONA

FORMER GOVERNOR MYRON McCORD DEAD IN PHOENIX

PHOENIX, April 29.—Myron H. McCord died at his home at 120 South Twenty-first avenue Monday afternoon of Bright's disease after a lingering illness of several weeks, during which he gradually sank until the end came quietly. Few men were as well known in Arizona as McCord. He was successively United States marshal of the port of Nogales, when he died, a member of the Arizona legislature, and a member of the Arizona bar. He was brought here from Nogales for treatment. Everything possible was done to save his life, but day by day he grew weaker until he lost consciousness. It was then realized that the end was fast approaching. With him when he died were his

cord was again honored by President McKinley, being made United States marshal of Arizona. Two years ago he was appointed collector at Nogales by President Roosevelt. McCord came to Arizona from a little town in northern Wisconsin, after a brilliant record in that state. He served Wisconsin in the house of representatives, occupying a seat next to McKinley. The friendship formed between them lasted until the assassination of McKinley. In Arizona, McCord has always been prominent in the ranks of the republican party. On account of his high standing among eastern leaders of the party he was several times honored by federal appointments. Few men in Arizona enjoyed the high regard and esteem in which McCord was held by all who knew him. Fearless in the performance of his duty as he saw it, he never hesitated to do that which might make a political enemy if he thought it to be for the best interests of the people whom he served. Last January, McCord was brought here from Nogales for treatment. Everything possible was done to save his life, but day by day he grew weaker until he lost consciousness. It was then realized that the end was fast approaching. With him when he died were his

wife and the attendants. Funeral arrangements have not yet been completed, but the remains will be sent to Wisconsin for burial. McCord was 67 years of age, and during his fifteen years in Arizona has always been prominent in its affairs.

ARIZONA NEWS AND COMMENT

Tempe will vote on a \$50,000 school bond issue on May 23. Bisbee men have purchased the laundry at Mesa. Commencement exercises of the Mesa high school will be held at the opera house in that city on Saturday evening, May 2. "Merry widow hats are all the rage," says a Phoenix advertiser. Maybe so; but they'll have to go some to keep up with the merry widows. R. G. Shawver, proprietor of the Cowboy corral, Phoenix, is very concerned over the mysterious disappearance of a man and a horse, the latter being his

property. Saturday morning a stranger applied for the renting of a saddle horse, saying he would be back about noon. At dark Sunday evening he had not yet returned. That is all Mr. Shawver knows of the incident, but it is evident that the horse and rider have either been overtaken by misfortune or the rider has deliberately stolen the property. The horse is a buckskin with white mane and tail and is branded bar H on the left side. He took no special notice of the man, but speaking from memory he would say that he was about twenty-five years old, smooth shaven, about five feet nine inches tall and would weigh about 140 pounds. The Arizona Medical society held a two-day session at Tucson this week. "Peccos" Higgins and "Rusty" Talk two well known cowboys who have spent their lifetime in following the cattle business in the Sulphur Springs valley, have at last forsaken for a while the real cowboy's life in Arizona for the ring, gilt and applause of the circus tinsel, and have left for Philadelphia, to join a company on a two years' tour of Europe. After a search of two or three weeks, the body of an old resident of Kingman named Redman was found on the mesa a couple of miles from Kingman. The man left under peculiar circumstances and it was feared at the time that he was insane, for which reason he was searched for continuously until the body was found. C. P. Silvernail of Flagstaff has been convicted and sentenced to the penitentiary for a year for writing obscene letters to Flagstaff women, about eighty of them, it is alleged, being sent, being mailed in Chicago. He professes innocence and an appeal has been taken. Silvernail is manager of a town hall, and the theory is advanced that the letters were written to spite his enemies, real or fancied.
