

ARIZONA MAY HAVE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL

(Continued from page 1.) unless the governor decides to call these men back in extraordinary session.

The Industrial School. The settlement of the industrial school question is a subject for considerable discussion and for evidence of much rivalry between Benson and Wilcox. This has come about through the resolution to investigate conditions at the Benson institution and report to the legislature. This resolution followed an investigation of conditions at the industrial school by some of the senators, who report the building in an extremely dilapidated condition, not only unfit for use for the purpose to which it is devoted, but positively dangerous. It is also the opinion of many that Benson is not the proper location for an institution of this kind; and there is a pretty strong sentiment in favor of the same at Tucson. As this suggestion was made, Wilcox came to the front to press its claims and since that time there has been much hurrying and scurrying about by representatives of the two towns. It is probable a majority of the senators favor the location of the institution from Benson but it is uncertain how the house will view the matter.

Physical Valuation Measure. The physical valuation question has at last come up. It has been injected into the senate by C. B. Wood in the form of a bill providing that telegraph and telephone companies shall be taxed on this basis, and there is another bill by the same author providing for the taxation of railroads in the same manner. A further taxation bill by Wood fixes a tax of 4 percent on the gross receipts of express companies. This is a little more liberal than the house bill dealing with the same subject, which fixes the rate at 5 percent. Express companies now pay 1 percent in this state.

The equalization bill has been recommended to the senate for passage. This bill provides for the appointment by the governor of an equalization board to consist of three members.

To Help the Saloon Man. A bill which has evoked some comment is one by representative Curry, just introduced in the house, which provides for the transfer of liquor licenses whenever desired by the holder. The bill also provides that whenever the holder of a liquor license goes out of business he shall be entitled to a rebate on his license to be determined by the time it has to run.

Don C. Babbitt, of this county, has introduced a bill providing that municipalities shall have the right to bond themselves to the extent of nine percent of the assessed valuation of their property. This can be done only on a referendum vote, however, and in cases where the money is to be used for public utilities.

Chaplains Get Salary Increase. Salaries of the two chaplains at the state prison have been raised from \$190 to \$300 a year by a bill just introduced in the house. A mistake in printing the bill made the chaplains' salaries \$200,000 a year each and was the cause of some merriment by the members.

The house bill permitting the sale of Phoenix sewer bonds has been killed. An opinion by the attorney general is to the effect that the measure is unconstitutional and therefore unconstitutional.

ROOSEVELT CLAIMS PENNSYLVANIA VOTE

Taft Also Claims to Have Carried the State Primaries.

Washington, D. C., April 12.—More than one-half of the 1918 delegates to the Republican national convention will have been selected at the conclusion of the Pennsylvania primaries today. Statements issued from the Taft and Roosevelt headquarters here show wide divergence in the claims of the delegates selected up to last night.

The Taft claim is: Taft, 338; Roosevelt, 115; LaFollette, 35; Cummins, 4; unstructured, 184.

The Roosevelt claim is: Roosevelt, 151; Taft, 45; LaFollette, 35; Cummins, 4; contested, 184; unstructured, 186.

The chief differences between the rival managers are in the southern states, where Roosevelt forces list as "contested" all of the delegates claimed by Taft; in Mississippi, where the delegation of 20 is claimed outright by both sides; and in New York, where 33 delegates are listed as "unstructured" by the Roosevelt manager, while the Taft managers claim 23 of them and concede seven to Roosevelt. The six Vermont delegates claimed for Taft are held as "unstructured" in the Roosevelt statement.

Democratic Figures. At the Clark headquarters the following statement of Democratic delegates was issued: Clark, 143; Marshall, 50; Wilson, 27; Burke, 16; unstructured, 11.

At the Wilson headquarters an estimate of 72 delegates was given as the total.

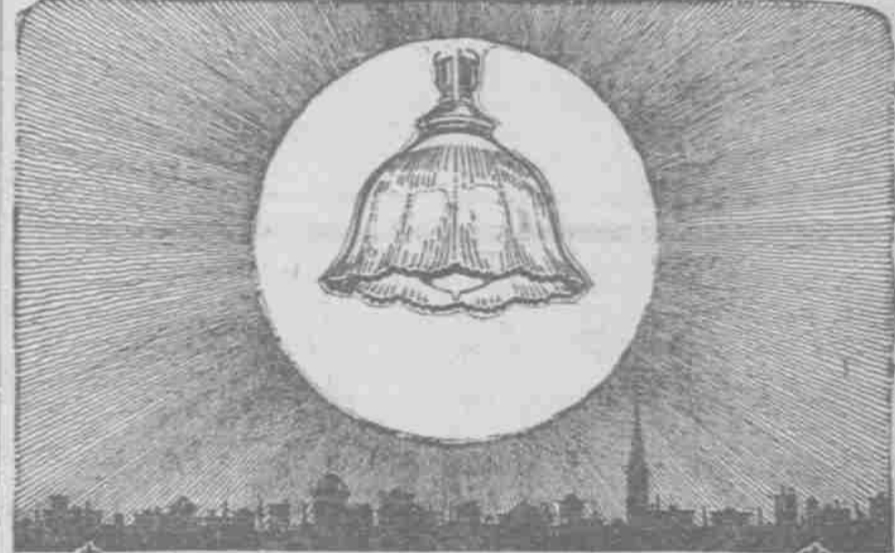
