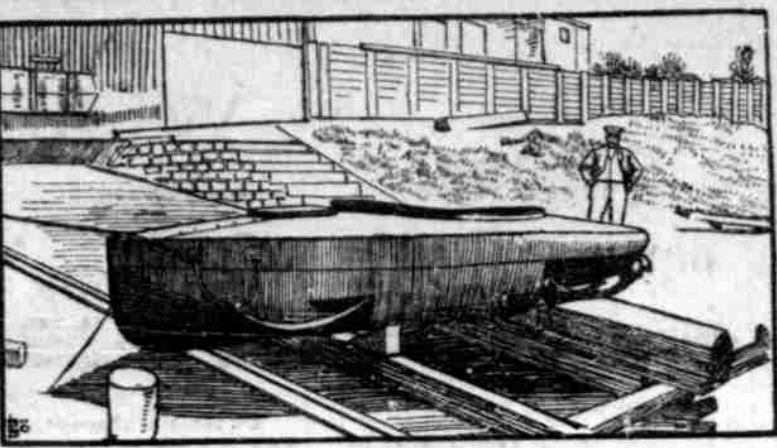
In truth, the republican enemies of Mr. Roosevelt, who desire that he shall neither have a third term nor nominate his own successor, seem to be raising up favorite sons in the states which would be most likely to decide the contest in favor of the president, unless they are held away from him by their own candidates in the earlier stages of the convention.

At this distance, it looks as if next year's republican convention will be a long deadlock with the chances as good for a dark horse as was the case in 1880, the only convention in which the attempt has been made to nominate a candidate for a third term in the white house.

In that convention the exercises began with Blaine, the plumed knight of Maine, concentrating in himself most of the opposition to Grant and the third term, but there were too many favorite sons with good backing for either of them to get a majority of the votes, so that on the thirty-sixth ballot the nomination went to the dark horse, Garfield.

If President Roosevelt should seek renomination of a man of his choice should go before the convention with good backing, we are apt to have something like a repetition of the convention in which Conkling and his Spartan band of 300 were ridden down by the Ohio men, who until the last ballot had never received more than fifty votes in the convention.

MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP LIKELY IN PHOENIX.

One of the important matters to be settled at the forthcoming city election in Phoenix is to finally prepare the way for municipal ownership of the water system in the capital city. About three years ago the citizens of Phoenix decided that it would be nice to own their own water system.

Having reached this decision they arranged for an election to vote a bond issue for the purpose of installing a municipally owned water system. The bonds were voted almost unanimously and it was expected that the private corporation owning the old water system would soon be down and out of business; but this reckoning it seems was without due consideration of troubles ahead.

The bonds of Phoenix were advertised and offered for sale in almost every city in the east. Many prospective buyers were interested in the purchase, but before Phoenix could reach the money General M. H. Sherman, owner of the old Phoenix water system, would reach the prospective bond purchaser and then the deal was off or up in the air.

Several times the Phoenix newspapers announced the bonds sold, but in every instance this man Sherman got to the buyer before Phoenix got to his money. Once a deal was so near closed that the city clerk was sent with the city bonds to Toledo, Ohio, for delivery. The city clerk had to affix his signature to the debentures before delivery and while he was in the back room of a bank, signing the bonds, an officer walked in on him and served an injunction restraining him from signing or delivering the bonds.

Finally, two years after voting a bond issue for municipal ownership of the water system of Phoenix, it dawned upon the people if they were ever to have municipal ownership the best thing to do was to rid the city of General Sherman and his resourceful agents and attorneys by purchasing his old system and plant. Negotiations for this were at once opened and soon it was agreed by the city council to pay \$150,000 for the old water system. At the coming city election in the capital city the voters will be called on to ratify this purchase.

Phoenix will, by ratifying the purchase of the old water system, take the matter of supplying city water into their municipal government.

AN ARIZONA BOOST FOR ROOSEVELT.

The Nogales Oasis last week reached its fifteenth mile post on the path of Arizona journalism. The Oasis was one of three or four papers in Arizona last year that supported joint-statehood and upheld the Roosevelt administration in its attempt to make of Arizona a province of New Mexico.

Despite all previous declarations that he will not consent to stand as a candidate for the presidency again, and despite all efforts of monopolists and their hired newspapers to make it seem that President Roosevelt is losing ground, there is every evidence that the people have given him their utmost confidence and will see to it that he remains in the presidential harness until completion of the great work he has inaugurated.

MINES AND MINING NEWS PARAGRAPHS

CURE DEALING NO GOOD.

FROM SUBURBAN SONORA. Dr. Ackerman is in Douglas from the south land. The doctor's field of professional work is about 100 miles square and covers the finest part of the great Sonora mining field.

Associated with other parties he has also bonded the Caridad to the Guggenheims for a handsome figure. This property is situated about three miles east of El Globo.

EL GLOBO. Surprising progress has recently been made in El Globo in the nature of a strike or unusual proportions and as high in values as that property has ever produced.

A score of practically undeveloped private properties near the Globo are now receiving vigorous attention at the hands of their owners, who are distinctly elated over developments in the Globo.

The Pittsburg, on which a ten stamp mill has been erected and housed for years and which belongs to the Sonora Development company, would, in the opinion of many parties well acquainted in that locality, justify a resumption of operations.

Reports submitted and accepted at the meeting of the Elizabeth Gold Mining people yesterday are eminently satisfactory. Aside from progress made in development and conditions existing in the properties, the economy carried out is highly commendable.

GENERAL NEWS. The Pilares de Nacoari has inaugurated a more expanded system of work to prepare for the big concentrator. It will be several months before the new works will be completed.

The prediction is made by many that Nacoari or Flacetas, as it is locally known, will be a city of 20,000 people within three years. No optimistic predictions can well be exaggerated when it applies to a district which is budding forth in the manner for which the Nacoari district is now distinguished.

Most of the machinery belonging to the Arizona Mining and Trading company's hoist is on the ground and the machine will be installed without delay when shipping ore will immediately accumulate on the bluff, there being no chance for a dump at present.

A very fair specimen of copper ore, in which silver is apparently well represented, came in from the Ceniza property yesterday. The property belongs to Frank Douglas and others and is on the eastern confine of the Santa Rosa district.

Word from the Monte Vista company is applied to the mature development of the property and the policy has succeeded in uncovering a mine before making any outlay in the direction of road and reduction works.
