Republican Territorial Convention

PHOENIX, ARIZ., Jan. 28, 1904. The republicans of the Territory of Arizona are hereby called to meet in delegate convention in the City of Tucson, on Tuesday, March 8th, 1904, at 10 o'clock a.m., for the purpose of electing six delegates and six alternates to attend and represent said territory at the National Republican Convention, to be held in the City of Chicago, in the state of Illinois, on the 21st day of June, 1904, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before said convention.

The basis of representation of the several counties in said convention will be one delegate for every 50 votes cast at the last general election for Hon. Robert E. Morrison for delegate to congress and one additional delegate for each fraction over 25. Such delegates shall be chosen, not less than three days before the assembling of said Territorial Convention, either by primary election, or in such other manner as the County Republican Central Committee of the respective counties may determine.

Upon the foregoing basis the apportionment will be as follows: County, Morrison Vote, No. Delegates. Apache 356 7, Cochise 1157 23, Coconino 583 12, Gila 409 8, Graham 753 15, Maricopa 1599 32, Mohave 292 6, Navajo 326 7, Pima 940 19, Pinal 254 5, Santa Cruz 259 5, Yavapai 1960 39, Yuma 351 7.

Chicago Theater Fire Reproduced by Electricity

The greatest of the modern electrical exhibitions, reproduced by electricity, as witnessed last night at the Trip to the Moon Show. Wild effort to escape in the parquet. Mad rush on the balcony stairs. Children escaping over a plank stretched across an alley and leading from the upper balcony to the Tremont house, opposite. Rescuers at work in front of the theater. Seeking relatives and friends in temporary morgues. The stage showing debris. Exit doors locked. No signs shown. Stage and orchestra and north boxes. S. southwest view of the gallery. The fatal stairway, where bodies were piled up eight and ten feet deep. Same stairway, looking up. Another exit, where the hundreds perished. Taking measurements of fatal doorway. North boxes from the stage. Spot light, cause of fire. The proscenium flue. The stage exit, which caused the awful draft. Exterior, showing entrance to theater during fire. Near view of main entrance during fire. Rear of theater, showing bridges of ladders over which many escaped to the Northwest Dental College. Theater entrance, bodies on the sidewalk. Loading bodies into fire patrol. Loading bodies into ambulance. Bodies in the theater as they fell. Fire patrol loaded with bodies. Exterior of morgue. Interior of temporary morgue with bodies in rows. Davis and Powers, resident managers of theater. In the alley of Death and Mutilation, jumping from the fire escapes to escape the flames. In the Pale Moonlight Scene, on the stage at time of fire. In addition to the above, the statue that comes of life, the flying lady and Edison's latest, the trip to the moon. A special entertainment was given yesterday for the public school children and their teachers. It certainly proved a great treat to them.
