NOW FOR A GILA VALLEY FAIR

An exhibition of the different farm products of the valley, together with new machinery that is being rapidly introduced, and which is not only labor saving, but is successfully used to bring in large areas under cultivation, would not only be interesting, but would surely be helpful to the new farmer just starting to clear his land and get it ready for cultivation.

A horse and cattle show would also be very interesting, and would show the progress being made in breeding fine horses and cattle.

The fair would bring together all the people of the valley, and there is no doubt that it would be successful in every way. Let us all get together and boost the first annual fair of the Gila Valley.

Big Reduction in Surplus of Copper

The report of the Copper Producers Association which was made public in Boston, July 9th, was more encouraging than had been expected, showing a larger falling off in the surplus on hand than had been anticipated.

The reduction in the surplus of red metal on hand was also larger than that shown by the June report when the reduction was 13,300,000 while the present report shows a reduction of approximately 14,990,080. This leaves the present surplus of copper on hand as standing under 154,858,061 or a supply at the present consumption of thirty-five or thirty-six days, and very much less than that when the demand is normal.

The production in June was 116,567,493 pounds, a decrease of 1,788,653 pounds over May, while production decreased from 148,505 pounds to 131,557,573 pounds.

The report also shows that the companies on an average are producing about 60 per cent of their capacity.

Indications are strong for an increase demand of copper and a continued and heavier decrease in the surplus of metal on hand from now on. Although the copper situation must be taken as highly improved.

North Butte today reported its output for the month of June as being 3,339, pounds.

LOCO POISON IDENTIFIED

Barium the Element Which Causes Death of Horses and Cattle

The so-called loco disease of horses, sheep and cattle has been for many years a source of serious loss to stockmen in the west, who have generally attributed it to certain weeds eaten by the stock. Investigations by the United States department of agriculture have not only confirmed the supposition as to the poisonous effect of these plants, but have resulted in the discovery and identification of barium as a definite poisonous element in them. Feeding was carried on under field and corral conditions by Dr. D. C. Marsh, while the discovery of barium was made in the laboratory by Dr. A. C. Crawford.

The loco weeds are a class of leguminous plants of which the principal ones are the purple loco weed (Astragalus mollissimus) and the rattle-weed (Aragaluis lamberti). One or both of these prevail to a greater or less extent over an area including all or parts of Montana, Wyoming, North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Nebraska, Kansas, Colorado, Utah, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma.

The characteristic symptoms of the disease are a slow staggering gait, rough coat, staring, vacant look and emaciation. The affected animals have hallucinations, can not be led or backed, show more or less lack of muscular co-ordination, gradually lose flesh and die. The affection comes on in a slow and cumulative manner and there is no possibility of animals becoming immune by continually eating the plants.

The proverb, "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," applies to this disorder. Although good results can often be obtained by the treatment of locoed animals, the most effective way of dealing with the trouble is to keep animals from eating the loco plants. Wherever practicable the weeds should be exterminated from the range or pasture and the best way of doing this is simply to cut them out. This method, however, while often practicable on land under private control, can not very well be applied to the public range. In many cases much can be accomplished by keeping animals away from loco covered ranges during the time when feed is short, as they are much more likely to contract the habit at such a time. It may sometimes be profitable to feed them for a short time, in order that the loco-eating habit may not be formed.

After animals have become afflicted the first essential in their treatment is to place them where they can not eat the loco weeds. They should be given plenty of nutritious feed, and so far as practicable feed with laxative properties, such as green alfalfa. Some may recover under this treatment without recourse to medicine. With most animals, however, recovery is hastened by medical treatment.

As a result of its experiments the department of agriculture suggests the following treatment: For cattle, strychnine in doses of three-twentieths to four-twentieths of a grain daily, administered hypodermically. For horses, Fowler's solution of arsenic in half ounce doses daily in drinking water or in their grain. This treatment should be continued for at least one month. To correct the constipation which is almost universal in locoed animals, magnesium sulphate (epsom salt) may be administered as a drench in two-ounce doses. Epsom salt may also serve to correct

as an antidote to the poison produced by the weeds. Beneficial results have also been obtained by giving horses daily a drench containing two ounces of epsom salt with ten drops of dilute sulphuric acid, and by giving cattle tri-weekly three to four ounces of epsom salt with a proportional increase in the quantity of dilute sulphuric acid. As the foregoing treatments are in the experimental stage, the bureau of animal industry, Washington, D. C., would be glad to receive reports of results from their use.
