HIDALGO HAPPENINGS.

The Dougherty-Vela Wedding a Brilliant Affair.

Hidalgo, Tex., July 2.—The board of examiners of teachers for the public schools of this county finished their labors on the 20th ult. They were occupied two full days. Twenty-one applicants were examined and received their certificates of competency to teach, four of the first grade, eleven of the second grade, and six of the third grade. Of the old teachers there were fourteen who did not receive certificates, some on account of bad morals, and others for incompetency. Of the applicants there were twelve new ones, that is to say, persons who did not teach last year. Take them as a whole, we have a far better lot of school teachers than the "outs" were. I will write more at length about our public schools in the near future.

Your correspondent is informed by a gentleman of veracity that in the "Porvenir" of the 28th ult., a Spanish newspaper published in Brownsville, there appeared a paragraph to the effect that a poor Mexican had been arrested a few days since in this town by the new administration of justice, cast into jail, and a few days after was crossed over the river and delivered to Col. Antonio Madero, military commander in Reynosa, Mexico, who forthwith ordered the poor man to be shot.
