**U. S. ASKED TO SAVE PRISONER**

**VILLA THREATENS TO MURDER TERRAZAS UNLESS RANSOM IS PAID.**

**UNDERGOES TORTURE BY REBELS**

Already Has Surrendered \$650,000; Big Additional Sum Demanded As Price of His Life.—Held Prisoner By Rebels.

El Paso.—General Luis Terrazas appealed to Marion Letcher, consul at Chihuahua, now in this city awaiting instructions, to save his son Luis whose life has been made the forfeit if \$500,000 pesos ransom money is not paid over to General Francisco Villa, the rebel leader.

Consul Letcher declared himself deeply moved by the appeal of the octogenarian head of the great Mexican family, whose wide possessions have been confiscated by the constitutionalists, but he had to reply that he was helpless in the matter.

While General Terrazas did not say as much, the interview left the inference that he is not now in possession of the sum demanded. Luis, the son, is about 50 years old and for several months has been held prisoner by the rebels.

**Tortured by Rebels.**

At the time of his arrest the rebels demanded \$650,000 gold as the price of his life. The sum was slow in being paid and Luis was taken out and a noose adjusted about his neck. Then he was gently hoisted from his feet. The torture was repeated until he demanded that he would pay the sum demanded—all that he had in the Chihuahua bank.

After this incident he was removed from the palace, where he had been confined and allowed to live under guard with his family in one of his father's houses. Women relatives some time later appealed to Villa to release him but Villa was adamant.

**Fortune Fades.**

Personal appeal to Secretary Bryan was suggested, but the old man merely shook his head. An appeal, however, may be made unless it is possible to raise the ransom money. The great bulk of the Terrazas fortune, normally estimated at \$40,000,000 gold, was tied up by the confiscation order and most of the money available in foreign countries has been spent in the last three years.

The most serious obstacle in the way of a settlement of the matter is Villa's refusal to allow Don Luis to leave Mexico after the money is paid.

General Terrazas, in replying to Villa, made payment of the money contingent on his son being brought to the center of the international bridge here while the sum was changing hands.

This Villa flatly declined to do. General Terrazas regards any other arrangement as folly, as his son, he thinks, doubtlessly would be used merely as a means of further extortion.

**WORST IN QUARTER CENTURY**

**WAS LAST WEEK'S STORM ON ATLANTIC COAST**

Eleven Deaths in New York City Alone.—Wire Service Badly Crippled.

Washington.—The storm which gripped the entire east for twenty-four hours, paralyzing traffic, demolishing telegraph and telephone lines and causing tremendous losses to property and business generally has been the most destructive in this section of the country since the memorable blizzard of 1888.

Reports showed the damage to be widespread. From Cleveland on the west and Baltimore on the south to the Canadian and Nova Scotia border the storm has been general. In New England further damage is expected from rivers and streams swollen by melting ice and snow.

There have been eleven deaths in New York City alone.

Telegraph company officials said they could not estimate at this time cost of making repairs. The loss to one company alone was placed at \$200,000 for this vicinity alone. Citing the lesson taught at the time Washington was cut off from communication on the day of the Taft inauguration, telephone company officials declared that at no time has telephone service to the capital been cut off completely. After the experience in 1909 wires to Washington were placed underground.

**WILSON SPEAKS ON CANAL TOLLS**

Joint Session of Congress to Hear Views of the President.

Washington.—President Wilson personally addressed a joint session of congress, advocating repeal of the clause in the Panama canal act which exempts American coastwise ships from the payment of tolls.

The president had prepared a brief address in which he set forth his opinion that congress should reverse itself and keep the obligations of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty which he believes were violated by the Panama act. The president holds that national honor is at stake and that European nations should not be allowed to believe that treaties made by the American government are not adhered to both in letter and in spirit. The exemption clause, he points out, was passed on the assumption that while the Hay-Pauncefote treaty guaranteed equal treatment to all nations in the matter of tolls, the matter was to be interpreted as meaning all nations except the United States.

**CATTLEMEN IN OKLAHOMA CITY**

Panhandle and Southwestern Association in Annual Convention.

Oklahoma City.—Hundreds of cattlemen from all over Oklahoma, Texas and other southwestern range states were in the city, some coming in delegations 250 strong and bringing their bands with them, others singly or in small parties, to attend the convention of the Panhandle-Southwestern Stockmen's Association.

El Paso and Amarillo delegations arrived at about the same time, the special train bearing the former party coming from the south. The Amarillo crowd came from the north, being routed via Kiowa, Kan.

**Income Tax Returns Made.**

Washington.—The last day has gone for filing income tax returns but no official count of the number of individuals who are to pay the tax, nor estimate of what the nation will collect from them will be available for several days. At the time the tariff was in debate in congress it was estimated that the income tax would bring about \$50,000,000 and that about 400,000 individuals would pay. Officials are hopeful that these figures would be equalled or surpassed when the returns are all in.

**THE LAW BUILDING IS DEDICATED**

Governor Cruce Makes Principal Address at State University.

Norman.—The University of Oklahoma law school was conceived in misfortune, born in adversity and has struggled against huge obstacles since its formation, but today it is housed in one of the finest structures in the country devoted to the training of lawyers and probably has experienced the most remarkable growth of any like institution in the entire nation.

This, the keynote to the address of Governor Lee Cruce, proved also the keynote to the elaborate and impressive ceremonies with which the new \$125,000 building on the university campus was formally christened Monday in honor of Dr. Julien C. Monnet, dean of the school, and dedicated to the service of the state.

**CATTLEMEN SELECT EL PASO, TEX.**

Oklahoma City Convention Comes to a Close With Election.

Oklahoma City.—Winning by a majority of thirteen votes, El Paso captured the 1915 convention of the Panhandle-Southwestern Stockmen's Association, defeating Amarillo, its only opponent, in a contest which has been waged with unabated intensity since the cattlemen's convention opened here last week. The final ballot county showed the following results: El Paso, 148; Amarillo, 135.

P. H. Landerlin of Vega, Texas, was chosen president of the association for the ensuing year, succeeding W. B. Slaughter. Other officers elected were: J. H. Nations of El Paso, first vice president; R. DeGraffenreid of Buchanan, N. M., second vice president; Lee Bivens of Amarillo, Texas, treasurer, and William Harrell of El Paso, Texas, secretary.

Rio Janiero Besieged in Revolution. Buenos Aires, Argentina.—A state of siege was proclaimed at Rio Janiero, Brazil. Reports have been current for some time that a revolutionary movement was in existence in the Brazilian states of Pernambuco, Ceara and Para and that fighting was in progress between local forces and government authorities.
